Construction cost/sq. ft.: \$184 (new); \$74 (renovation)

Total construction cost (excluding land): \$21,730,000 (new); \$852,000 (renovation)

The Ambulatory Services Building was designed to provide additional outpatient services for the University of Wisconsin Hospitals and Clinics on the main campus in Madison. Outpatient clinics in this building include the Comprehensive Cancer Center, the Heart Center, the outpatient Radiology Department, the Women's Breast Imaging Center, the ENT Clinic, and shell space for future clinics. The addition connects to the existing hospital circulation system with an atrium.

The atrium serves as a new entry on the northwest side, a connection to the existing "Main Street" clinics' circulation, and an organizational element for all the clinics that have their entries and waiting areas off the atrium.
